<u>Tues 17<sup>th</sup> April Doug Stuckey</u> will talk about Canal Archaeology – concentrating on our work at Whitehouses and Three Locks, but including background research.

<u>Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> May Jill Eyers</u> will run a session on flint and stone tool identification, dating and drawing. This is a mainly practical **session**. Everyone is welcome at these meetings, on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday of the month from September through to May, at 7.30pm at the County Museum – entrance by the side door from the path by the church.
