
#### BUCKINGHAMSHIRE'S SAXON PRINCE: THE BURIAL AT TAPLOW

HIGH WYCOMBE: Saturday 28th April 2018 at 2.30pm. Admission free.

Speaker: Leslie Webster, former Senior Keeper of the British Museum's Anglo-Saxon collections

The princely burial at Taplow was the most important burial of the Saxon period known in England before the discovery at Sutton Hoo. Leslie Webster, who formerly looked after the Taplow finds at the British Museum, will tell the story of their excavation and describe some more recent discoveries.


Missenden Abbey, founded in 1133, was one of five Augustinian houses in Buckinghamshire. Although mostly demolished in 1538 part survived as a house, only to be damaged by fire in 1985. Dr Franklin will set the abbey in its medieval context. Dr Edwards will describe its archaeology.




Mediaeval Tile from Missenden Abbey


