A DOCUMENT RELATING TO WHADDON CHASE IN THE 16th CENTURY.

By the great courtesy of Lady Pigott-Brown, some of the numerous documents from Doddershall formed the subject of an address to the Society in General Meeting on 10 May, 1937; the papers then described and exhibited it is hoped to publish together, as they bear directly upon the history of the County. Papers of family or manorial interest were excluded, and the imperfect document here printed was not mentioned as it relates to Whaddon Chase, the keepership of which Serjeant Pigott¹ inherited from his mother,—heiress The Serjeant died on 25 Feb. 1520 of the Giffards. N.S. and his widow was called to account for waste and destruction within the Queen's Chase and Park of Whaddon, from the time of her husband's death till Michaelmas 18 Hen. VIII (i.e. 1526). Our fragment is undated but since it summarizes certain allowances, wages to keepers, &c. for five years there seems no reason to doubt that it forms her reply or defence to the charges brought against her. One of these charges was that she had felled trees and carried them to "for the building of her new house Doddershall there;" this is not specifically answered, and it would be interesting to know whether any of the great wallposts and heavily moulded ceiling-beams in the Stone Hall (which the Historical Monuments Commissioners place early in the 16th century), actually came from Whaddon,—and how such massive timbers were taken

Coming to our document we find mention of gates and fencing for Creslow, and the pounds at Swanbourne³ and at Whaddon; later on an allowance of twenty loads of fire-wood for the Prior of Snelshall occurs, and

further allowances for the keeper of the park, and for deer-browse. Finally, she comes to the sales of timber necessary to pay the wages and liveries of the keepers, which were:—

The total of this is £8, which comes to £40 for the five years, whilst 1300 load of wood were sold, at 6d. a load, for £32 10s. 0d., so the balance of £7 10s. 0d., "was made off other woode in the queny's Chace."

Imperfect fragment as it is, the facts and figures contained in it seem to deserve recording.

. . . . hereunto the said Elizabeth sayth as Tymber for fellyng off whiche warrants to show matter off dyssarge that is to say iiij tres were fellyd by the queny's warrant for makyng of stakes, yatys, & yate posts for the kyng's maner of Craslowe in the Counte of Buck,' & lyke wyse xv okes were fellyd for the makyng off the queny's pownde at Suanburne & iij okes were fellyd for . . . off the quenys pownde at Whaddon, & vi okes were fellyd . . . to pyn hoggs & ij okes were assygned to Walt' Taylor & Robt. Ry... tennants for the reparacyons off ther howsys, & xx okes were fellyd for the reparacyons off the queny's tennants at Whaddon, & xl okes were fellyd for the reparacyon off the parke pale & raylle in the said parke and also for making off stakes to be sett in the said parke for preservacyon off the were fellyd by the said Elizabeth for the reparacyons off her maner off Whaddon were fellyd for ploughbote & cartebote the whycch she & all other whos astate she hathe in the said maner off Whaddon hath had tyme owt off mynde appendant to the said Maner off Whaddon, & xx okes were wyndefalls the whych allso the seid Elizabeth & all they whos astate she hathe in the said maner of Whaddon hath usyd to have tyme owt of

And as to ye remnant off ye okes & asshes the said Elizabeth saythe that they were olde tres dottodds4 & wranglynges whyche were felde for fyer bote & the said fyer woodd was delyvered to certen persons that ought to have certen lodys off woode yerly to ther fyer out off the said parke & chaes, that ys to say to the Prior off Snelsalle verly xxti lode, summe off hys woodd for v yerys a clode, & to every keeper off v kepers off the parke & chaes verly xxti lode, summe off thys woodde for v yere last past ccccc lode. And also the seid Elizabethe saythe that the keeper off the parke hathe usyd to have alway alowyd hym yerly for kepyng off the palle vis viijd whycch amountyth to thys v yerys xxxiijs iiijd whycche hathe byn made every yere off the said okes & asshes & further more the seid Elizabeth [saythe] that the feller off the deer bruys ys alowyd yerly vjs viijd whycche cummythe to xxxiijs iiijd whycch also hath byn made yerly off the said okes & asshes, and also seythe that the making off the stakes set in the parke for preservacyon of the also was made off the seid okes & Asshes, & furthermore the said Elizabethe seyth other whos a state she hathe in the seid Maner off Whaddon hathe usyd to take fyer bote in the said parke & chaes, the whycche she extemyth to be yerly a c lodes summ off her wode for v yere ys v^c lodes the whycch she saythe hathe byn also made off the said okes & asshes. And furthermore seid Elizabethe that she ys redy to avaow the resydue off the said okes & asshes over & besyde ijc & xxviii wheroff no moo number off lods off woode then was afore rehersyd, & as to the xiijc lode off underwoode & bowes fellyd & cut downe in the seid parke & Chace the seid Elizabethe sevthe that yt was fellyd for dere browys every yere a parsell duryng the space off v yerys last past and after that every yere solde to make the keper's wages whyche was as yt ys prysyd at vid a lode cummythe to xxxijn xs and the keper's wages cummythe to yerly with ther lyvere viij", that ys to say to Robte. Wyllyott xls & for his lyvere vis viijd, to the
