OBITUARY, 1943-4

The Society has to record the loss of two members of the Council: Admiral Richard P. F. Purefoy, C.B.E., M.V.O., who died on 19 Dec., 1943, aged 81. The Admiral was as assiduous in his attendance at the Council as in the performance of his other duties, and his interest in the Society was made evident by the way he welcomed the Annual Excursion at Shalstone in 1931, and by documents associated with his family's lengthy association with that place which have come to the Museum since his death.

The other member was Col. Stanley Barry, C.M.G., C.B.E., D.S.O., M.V.O., of Long Crendon, whose interest in the work of the Society remained active so

long as his health allowed.

MRS. C. S. Baker, who had been a member since 1902, continued the long association which had begun with her husband, Dr. Baker, when he served on the Council. Her unobtrusive services to the Society were continuous and deserve to be recorded in this humble way.

Amongst other, and less active members whose loss the Society has to deplore, were Dr. Louisa Garrett-Anderson, C.B.E., the Rev. Canon and Mrs. Cooper, of Iver, the Rev. G. Street, and Mr. E. J. McCarthy.

ANNUAL MEETING

The Society's Annual Meeting took place on 22 Apr., 1944, with Lord Cottesloe, vice-president, in the chair, as Lord Justice Mackinnon, the president, was

unavoidably prevented from attending.
