### THE SOCIETY

MEETINGS: A considerable number were arranged during the year. In March Dr. Oakley lectured on "Some Recent Prehistoric Discoveries in East Africa" to members in the Amersham area. At the Annual General Meeting at Aylesbury in May, Mr. F. W. Grimes gave a lecture, illustrated with slides, on "Roman London". In August the Society entertained, at the Museum, the International Geological Congress, the leader of which was Dr. Arkell, and later in the year another Meeting was arranged in Aylesbury, when the film "Beginnings of History" was shown.

In early July an interesting experiment was undertaken, with which the Society was closely concerned. The Education Committee of the County Council arranged that one of their week-end courses at the Adult Education College at Missenden Abbey should deal with local history and archaeology. The Society was responsible for arranging the speakers. The course lasted from Friday evening until Sunday midday, and the speakers included Mr. Markham, Mrs. Sansome, Mr. Perrins, Mr. Jenkins, and Dr. Morley Davies. This was a most happy experiment which should certainly be repeated; tribute must be paid to Mr. J. W. Dunnill, who was responsible not only for the administrative arrangements, but also for presiding at the meetings and doing his utmost to make the week-end a pleasant one for all those attending.

Dr. A. Morley Davies gave his lecture on the early history of Buckinghamshire, at Missenden Abbey, on Sunday, 4th July, 1948. Premising that, as a county, Buckinghamshire was a little over a thousand years old, he traced the successive human occupation of the region from prehistoric times down to the end of the Middle Ages, when the forcible depopulation of many parishes of North Bucks. took place. The only novel point made was in reference to the local tradition at Iver, that the Saxon church had been burned by the Danes. This tradition seems to telescope two events more than a century apart—the presence of Danish refugees from defeat at Farnham, within a mile of Iver church, in 893, and the burning of the church, probably not then built, of which evidence can still be seen.

A meeting was held, mainly for the benefit of members in the south of the County, in Gerrards Cross, on Saturday, 10th April, 1948, when Mr. E. CLIVE ROUSE, F.S.A., spoke on 'Some Buckinghamshire Wall paintings and their Meaning'. The lecture was illustrated by lantern slides, and showed examples of wall painting, in which our County is unusually rich, at Chalfont St. Giles, Little Missenden, Little Kimble, Eton College, Little Hampden, Broughton, and elsewhere. The unusual *Morality* subjects at Broughton, Swanbourne, and Little Horwood, and their literary and sociological background, were especially mentioned.

The chair was taken by the Bishop of Buckingham, who welcomed a very large audience which filled the Masonic Hall. The experiment was made of throwing the meeting open to the public; and it is hoped that by this means interest in the antiquities of our County and in the work of our Society will be increased. A number of new members resulted from the meeting. If volunteers were forthcoming to act as Local Secretaries, it is felt that similar meetings, and perhaps local excursions in the summer, could be arranged in various places in our long and awkward County. Centres like Slough, Buckingham, Newport Pagnell, and Bletchley might well prove suitable.

BLEDLOW CROSS: This well-known landmark on the Chiltern Hills had been obscured during the war years by a covering of brushwood faggots. Its surface had consequently become overgrown with moss and weeds, and was barely visible.

On 27th September, 1947, members of the Society living in the neighbourhood were invited to visit it and restore the surface to its original colour.

The President and twelve members and their friends responded, and equipped with rakes and hoes, they scraped the surface of the Cross down to the original chalk subsoil. A few small trees and bushes which were partly concealing the north-western arm were cut down, and the Cross has again become a visible feature of the landscape.

During 1948 Mr. and Mrs R. G. Sheppard were appointed Resident Caretakers at the Museum: they now occupy a flat on the second floor.
