THE SOCIETY

Membership

During 1994, we learnt with regret of the deaths of Lord Cottesloe (Society Trustee and ex-president), D Anderson, Dr A M Barrett, J H Broadbent, E B Dorrance, Mrs R A Leaver, Miss G E Mead (left £1,000 to the Museum), and J H P Roberts. At the end of 1994, we totalled 563 members – 316 ordinary, 106 familycounted as two, one junior, 19 honorary and life, 3 ex-officio, and 12 affiliated societies.

The report and accounts for 1993 and the 1994 AGM agenda were included in the Spring Newsletter. The 1994 AGM minutes were reproduced in the Autumn Newsletter.

Council met five times with Dr Arnold Baines FSA as Chairman. Council appointed Ted Bull to serve out the term of Barry Lane who resigned.

Library & Museum Sub-Committee

Society representatives were the President (Elliott Viney Esq FSA), Dr A H J Baines FSA and Dr R P Hagerty, all three being members of the Museum Panel. Representative on the new Countywide Consultative Committee for Museums and the Countywide Advisory Committee for Archaeology was Dr Hagerty.

On 25 April, Mrs Norma Major unveiled a plaque to commemorate the roofing over of the new Art Gallery structure in the County Museum. She was escorted by Sir Timothy Raison, prime mover of the Art Gallery appeal which achieved its target of £500,000 in the autumn. Three-year £2.3M refurbishment by the County Council of Museum buildings continued on schedule for completion by April 1995. After fitting out the interior and setting out the displays, it was intended to re-open the Museum in October. Meanwhile, every effort was made by the Curator to raise the nearly £200,000 needed to fully equip the Roald Dahl Gallery so that

it can be opened at the same time as the rest of the Museum.

Local Government Commission

The LGC preferred recommendations were that Buckinghamshire County Council should be dissolved and replaced by three or four Unitary Authorities derived from present districts.

Council expressed strong concern at the catastrophic effect dismantling of the County Council could have on county wide "heritage" services, such as the Record Office, Museum and Archaeological services. Also endangered could be the County Historic Buildings service, the Kedermister Library and the County Library with its Buckinghamshire Collection.

Council was aiming to complete a 120-year lease of the County Museum with the County Council, to replace the current lease expiring in 1999, hoping that the existence of a long-term lease would help to guarantee the future of the Museum in the case of demise of the County Council.
