THE CHURCH PLATE OF BUCKINGHAMSHIRE.

RURAL DEANERY OF MURSLEY.

The notes which follow are the first instalment of a survey of the Church Plate of the Archdeaconry of Buckingham, which was undertaken for the Archæological and Architectural Society in 1891. The long delay in publication is due partly to the compiler's repeated absence from England, partly to the fact that of the schedules issued to every parish less than half have been returned at all, and of those which have been filled in, all needed a detailed revision; while in many cases the work has practically had to be done over again. The fullest acknowledgment, however, is due to all those who have attempted what must have been a very unfamiliar task, and in particular for the elaborate drawings which have accompanied many of the returns.

The compiler has in every case examined the vessels, and compared his own observations with the returns. The only point on which there is likely to be any error is in the weights. Troy weights are not accessible everywhere, and in those cases where the symbol w. is enclosed in square brackets, it is to be understood that the weight was ascertained in oz. avoirdupois, and reduced approximately to oz. troy. In a few cases, however, it has been possible to ascertain the troy weight of the

vessels directly.

The numbers appended to the several parishes are those under which they stand in the Diocesan Calendar.

The chronological summary at the end includes only the silver vessels; the pewter and plated vessels are not sufficiently well fashioned or dated to justify tabulation.

This beautiful cup is of the "prescribed form," with deep body and short foot. It has two bands of the usual ornament on the bowl (Pl. ii. 3); all the ornaments are parcel-gilt.

2. PATEN.—Plated. H. 1½ in., diam. 9 in. Sacred monogram, and the inscription: "Aston Abbotts, 1861." Bought of Mr. Field, Aylesbury, 1861.

3. F_{LAGON} —Plated. H. $9\frac{1}{2}$ in., diam. top $3\frac{1}{2}$ in., base $4\frac{3}{4}$ in. Monogram and inscription as on the Paten, with which it was bought.

4. Almsdish.—Brass, engraved. Bought 1890. 5-7. Cross and Candlesticks.—Brass. Prese 1888. Flower-vases.—Brass. Presented 1895.

- 1. C_{UP} WITH COVER-PATEN.—Silver. H. $5\frac{1}{2}$ in., diam. base $3\frac{1}{2}$ in., bowl $3\frac{1}{2}$ in., depth 4 in., w. 8 ozs. 4 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1692. Maker's mark: S H, linked in plain shield (cf. Cripps O.E.P.4, p. 366 (1684); but the latter is in a round stamp, with a border of dots). The cup is quite plain, and of similar type to that at Tattenhoe, q.v.
- 2. Cover-Paten of No. 1.—Silver. H. $\frac{3}{4}$ in., diam. 3\frac{3}{4} in, foot 2 in., w. 2 ozs. 16 dwts. 6 grs. Hallmarks and maker's mark as on the cup, but much defaced. Inscription: "Anno $Do\overline{m}$. 1692."
- 3. F_{LAGON} .—Pewter. H. $7\frac{1}{2}$ in., diam. 3 in., base $4\frac{1}{2}$ in. No marks. A short, wide variety of the cylindrical type, with spout.

1. CUP WITH COVER.—Silver. H. 7 in., diam. bowl $3\frac{1}{2}$ in., base $3\frac{1}{4}$ in., depth of bowl 4 in., $\lceil w \rceil$ 7 ozs. 1 dwt. Hallmarks: London, 1569. Maker's mark: A shaped stamp, like a "Britannia" lion's head.

COVER WITH FOOT-HANDLE.—H. 1¼ in., diam. 3½, [w.] 2 oz. Same Hallmarks and maker's mark. This is a large specimen of the "prescribed form." The band of ornament runs close under the rim, and is shown in Pl. ii. 4. About one-third down the bowl is a prominent moulding, from which depend foliated ornaments of the usual type. (Pl. ii. 5.)

2. Cup (missing).—The following entry occurs in the

Parish Register:—

"4th July, 1756. Recd. then of the Rev. Mr. Lord, Rector of this Parish, one Cup with a Cover to it for the Communion Service. Wt. 4 oz. 5 dwts., with this inscription on it: 'In Usum Infirmorum.'"

THOS. WELLS, NEWMAN BATES, Churchwardens.

This Cup has now long disappeared. The existing "Cup with a Cover" is heavier, and has no inscription. The provision of a cup for private administration to the sick is unusual.

1. Paten.—Plated. Diam. 5¼ in.; modern. Inscription on the rim: "→ Do this in remembrance of Mc."

5. Flagon.—Plated. H. $8\frac{3}{4}$ in.; modern. Of the usual

type; quite plain.

6. Flagon.—Pewter. H. 9 in., diam. 4½ in. This is of unusual form. It stands on a high foot; and the body is short and cylindrical above, with a swelling below the bottom of the spout, which is covered above. Eighteenth century.

The following extract from a Terrier of 1855, copied with many other chronicles into the Parish Register, may be quoted, though it is inaccurate if it refers to the existing vessels, and though the weights are left blank.

Within and belonging to which [the Church] are 1 Communion table, with a covering for the same of Blue Velvet with one Cushion. Item: one linen cloth for the Communion Table, with one Napkin, one silver Flagon and chalice, weighing —, one silver paten.
. . . [Then follow minor Church fittings.]

- Cur.—Silver, bowl gilt outside. H. 6 in., diam. 3½ in., [w.] 10 ozs. 1 dwt. Hallmarks: London, 1809. Maker's mark: [RE] Inscription on bowl: "H. S. M. W.D.] Churchwardens, 1811." The bowl is nearly cylindrical; the slight lip has a marginal beading; the stem is short and thick, without central swelling; the foot has the characteristic triple beading of the period.
- 2. Paten.—Silver. H. 1 in., diam. $6\frac{1}{2}$ in., [w.] 9 ozs. $2\frac{1}{2}$ dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1811. Maker's mark: W.B. in oval. Inscription in script (a) in the centre, "Wm. Duncombe, Saml. Blick, Church-Wardens;" (b) round this, "A Gift from the Rev. H. S. Milner, D.C.L., to the Parish of Dunton, 1811." This is a salver on three feet which have convergent flutings and end in a small ball, of the same pattern as the plated almsdish (1797) at Little Horwood.
- 3. Flagon.—Silver. H. $7\frac{3}{4}$ in., diam. base $3\frac{1}{2}$ in., greatest $3\frac{3}{4}$ in. [w.] 13 ozs. 14 dwts. Plain. Hallmarks and maker's mark as on No. 2. Inscription round the body: "H. S. M. W.D. Churchwardens, 1811," as on No. 1.

This vessel is not a Flagon, but a Jug or Ewer without cover, of about one pint capacity, with quadruple beadings round the foot, the base of the body, and the greatest diameter.

Inscription on under-surface: "For the Service of the Altar in the Church of Hardwick. John White, LL.B., Rector, 1813." On uppersurface, Sacred Monogram, cross fitchée, and nails, within star of 27 rays.
- 3. Paten.—Silver. H. 13 in. diam. 6 in., [w.] 3 ozs. 13 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1871. Maker's mark: J.c. Sale-stamp: F. Smith & Co., London.
- 4. Flagon.—Silver. H. 10 in., diam. top 1¾ in., base 3⅓ in., greatest 3⅓ in., [w.] 13 ozs. 14 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1870. Maker's mark (same as on the Cap); cruet-shaped, with pear-shaped body, tapering upwards to a narrow neck with a spout and hinged cover surmounted by a Maltese cross.

 - A small but fine specimen of the "prescribed form;" the band of ornament is narrow, with simple interlacement and foliage appendages above and below (Pl. ii. 6). The base has been roughly mended.
 - 2. COVER-PATEN ON FOOT.—Silver? H. 1½ in., diam. 7½ in., foot 3½ in., [w.] 9 oz. 2 dwts. No Hallmarks. Maker's mark, half effaced ^R. Vide List of Marks. Sacred Monogram, cross fitchée and star, within a circle of rays, and the inscription: "Deo et ecclesiæ Hogiston, C. G. R. D. D. D." Rev. Charles Gataker, son of Rev. Thos. Gataker (vide below), was M.A. of Clare Hall, Cambridge (1674), and succeeded his father as Rector of Hoggeston, 1680. He died 10 Nov., 1701.
- 3. Flagon.—Silver. H. $7\frac{1}{2}$ in., diam. lip 4 in., base $5\frac{1}{2}$ in., [w.] abt. 27 oz. Hallmarks: London, 1683. Maker's marks: (1) T. C.; a fish above; a fleur-de-lys below; in shaped shield (Cripps O. E. P.4, p. 364 (1677); common on Kentish Church Plate of this period. (2) under the foot L. 3) on the handle, a trefoil.* This is a plain quart tankard with lid. Inscription: "Deo et ecclesiæ Hoges toniensi sacrum ex dono T. G. Rects., $168\frac{3}{4}$." Rev. Thomas Gataker was Rector of Hoggeston, 1646-1689, and is there buried.

- 5. Pair of Glass Cruets, with electroplate mounts; modern.

- Chalice.—Silver, bowl gilt inside. H. 8 in., diam. base 4³/₄-5 in., bowl 4 in., depth 3 in. [w.] 11 oz. 18 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1873. Maker's mark: HE in trefoil stamp. Hexagonal stem, with Sacred Monogram on one face of the base, and cross on opposite face; the knob of the stem is also ornamented with two crosses on each alternate face.
 - This replaces an older cup of silver, which is recorded in an inventory of the plate, undated, but made, as the writing and the watermark show, by the Rev. Richard Tomkyns (Rector, 1816, 6 Oct., to 1839), not earlier than 1819.
 - The following entries occur in an account book of the late Rector, Rev. S. T. Adams, as treasurer of the Great Horwood Church Restoration Committee:—

2-3.—Pair of Patens on Feet.—Silver. H. 1 in., diam. $7\frac{1}{4}$ in., foot $3\frac{1}{4}$ in., [w.] 8 oz. 2 dwts. Hallmarks: London (Britannia), 1697. Maker's mark: S I, in angular shield; a fish (?) below. (? Francis Singleton). Cripps O. E. P.⁴, p. 370 (1699); but the latter has a shaped shield. Sacred Monogram in circle of alternate rays. Inscription on rim: "The Gift of Charles Holloway, of London, Goldsmith, a Native of this Parish [*], for ye Sole & only use of ye Church of Great Horwood, in the County of Bucks." At *, in an oval between two cornucopiæ, are engraved the arms, arg. a fess, between three crescents, sable; a canton ermine). The same arms appear at Winchester College in the cornice of "School." Charles Holloway, son of Rev. Wm. Holloway, Rector (1702, 3 July, to 1718), buried 11 Aug., 1718, at Horwood), was baptised 18 July, 170c. He was Scholar of Winchester College (Founder's Kin), 1722-1724.

4. Flagon.—Silver. H. 11½ in., diam. lip 3½ in., base 6¼ in. [w.] 35 oz. 16 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1755. Maker's mark: T. W., in shaped stamp (= Thomas Whipham, entered 1739. Cripps O. E. P.4, p. 401 (1756), but the shield differs slightly). Inscription: "The Gift of Geo. Verney, of London, to the Parish of Great Horwood, in the County of Bucks, of Which he was a Native. For the Sole use of the Communion Table of the said Church, 1755." One George Verney, son of Robert and Elizabeth Verney, was baptised at Horwood on 7th July, 1723; another, the son of George and Hester Verney, on 29th August, 1708.

5. Almsdish.—Brass; modern. Sacred Monogram in six-cusped circle. Inscription on rim, "To do good and to distribute forget not." Candlesticks, flower vases, desk, &c.; brass; modern.

LITTLE HORWOOD.

CUP WITH COVER.—Silver. H. 5½ in., diam. base 3¼ in., bowl 3⅓ in., depth 3½ in., w. 7 oz. 5 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1562. Maker's mark: ? animal's head (much rubbed). The cup bears no inscription, and the cover, which is dated 1570, does not belong to it. It has a thick hollow stem with a simple curve, and no swelling or ridge like most of the cups of this series. It has the usual band of ornament near the rim, with simple interlacement and small pendants; the same band, but without pendants, is repeated on the foot. (Pl. ii. 1.)

2. Cover-Paten.—Silver. H. 1½ in., diam. 3¼ in., foot 1 in., w. 1 oz. 16 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1569. Maker's mark: I P in shaped shield (Cripps O.E.P.4, p. 345 (1566). Date 1570 engraved on the handle-foot. This cover does not belong to the cup; it does not fit it well, and has a different band of ornament; and it is unlikely that a "restored" cover would be engraved with a date which was not that of the original. It is probable, therefore, that the cover, at all events, came from elsewhere.

3-4.—Pair of Cups.—Plated copper. H. 75 in., diam. base 3½ in., bowl 3½ in., depth 35 in. No marks. Inscription as follows, on an oval plate affixed to the bowl: "Hic Calix Datus eft in Ufum Ecclefiæ Horwood Parvæ a Stephano Langfton, A.M., Vicario, A.C., 1797." The cups have long slender stems, with a round knob half-way; they are quite plain.

5. Paten.—Plated copper. H. $4\frac{1}{4}$ in., diam. $7\frac{1}{2}$ in., foot $4\frac{1}{8}$ in. No marks. Inscription as follows, on an oval plate: "Hæc Patina Data est in Usum Eccletiæ Horwood parvæ a Stephano Langston, A.M., Vicario, A.C., 1797." The Paten has a tall and very slender stem, and a

slightly raised rim.

6. Flagon.—Plated. H. $9\frac{7}{8}$ in., diam. top $4\frac{1}{4}$ in., base 6 in. No marks. Inscription on an oval plate: "Hæc Lagena Data eft. [...&c....] 1797," as on Nos. 3-5.

7. Almsdish.—Plated. H. $1\frac{5}{8}$ in., diam. 11 in. No

marks. Inscription as on No. 5.

N.B.—Revd. Stephen Langston, son of Sir Stephen Langston, Lay-Rector and Patron of Little Horwood, was Vicar, 1792-1818.

8. Almsdish.—Gilded metal. H. $\frac{7}{8}$ in., diam. 12 in. Rich repoussée ornament; Sacred Monogram in the centre; modern, presented by Mrs. Dauncey in 1889.

9. Sacring-Bell?—A small bronze bell. H. 1½ in., diam. 1½ in. of church-bell shape, was found in the foundation of the Chancel during the restoration of 1889, and is supposed to be a Sacring-Bell.

St. Mary. MURSLEY.

1. Cur.—Silver. H. $7\frac{1}{2}$ in., diam. base $3\frac{\pi}{4}$ in., bowl $3\frac{1}{2}$ in., depth 4 in., w. 10 oz. 7 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1794. Maker's mark: H. C. in oval (Henry Chawner, 1786–96). Cripps O.E.P.4, p. 387 (1788). Inscription: "In usum Ecclesiæ Parochialis de Mursley in Com Bucks, 1794." The cup has rather a deep bowl, and a tall stem with central swelling, and the characteristic multiple beading on the swelling and on the foot.

- 2. Paten.—Plated. H. ½ in., diam. 9 in. No marks. Quite plain.
- 3. Flagon.—Pewter. H. 9 in., diam. top 7 in., base $6\frac{1}{2}$ in.
- 4. Almsdish, Candlesticks (two pairs), etc.—Brass.

STEWKLEY.

- Cup.—Silver. H. 7¼ in., diam. bowl 4¾ in., base 4½ in., depth of bowl 3½ in., [w.] 13 oz. 6 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1654. Maker's mark: I.H. in pointed shield, a mullet above, a fish (?) below. This cup has a rather small bowl, and a tall stem with a prominent knob. It bears the following inscription, in plain script: "Stewkley: John Pilkington: Rector: Thomas Prentice William Grace: Churchwardens: 1671."
 - The two Churchwardens of Stewkley kept separate accounts at this time, and under the year 1671 occur, among others, the two following entries:—

 - The Accompt of William Grace Churchwarden of Stewkley Ano Domj 1671. Itm. for the silver cupp 02:00:00
 - This cup, if bought in 1671, must have come from elsewhere: and as its date falls under the Commonwealth, it may have been ejected at the Restoration
- 2. Cop.—Plated on hard metal. Gilt inside; modern. Inscribed, "Stewkley Parish."
- 3. Paten on Foot.—Silver. H. 15 in., diam. 67 in., foot 24 in., [w.] 9 oz. 3 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1723. Maker's mark: I. B. with mullet below, in trefoil shield (perhaps John Bignell (ent. 1720), quatrefoil, I B, mullet above and below, Cripps O. E. P., p. 375). The foot is clumsy, and has probably been added to the paten, which without it would have been a very

usual type of salver. There is a scar inside the foot, which may be the vestige of a hallmark; but it is indecipherable. Inscription in plain script: May it be accepted as the humble gift of Elizabeth Gurney, for the use of the sacred Temple of God at Stewkley, 1744.

- 4. Paten.—Plated on hard metal. Quite plain; modern. Belonging to No. 2.
- 5. Flagon.—Plated on hard metal. Sacred monogram, within rays, engraved in front. Imitation hallmarks below the rim, (1)? e in a round stamp, (2)? a cup, in rounded rectangle, (3) uncertain object in rounded rectangle, (4) lion to left in rounded rectangle.
- 6. Almsdish.—Brass; modern. Sacred Monogram engraved in centre. Inscription round the rim: "To do good and to distribute forget not."
 - A modern wooden box for bread, and two modern glass cruets are also in use.

The cup has a nearly cylindrical but slightly swollen bowl, and a tall, very slender stem with central knob.
 - The following entry occurs in the Parish accounts:-
 - 1809, Dec. 23, paid the Revd. Lemesures as per bill for a silver cup £11 17 0
- 2. Paten on Foot.—Silver. H. $1\frac{3}{4}$ in., diam. $5\frac{1}{10}$ in., foot $2\frac{1}{8}$ in., [w.] 5 oz. 1 dwt. Hallmarks: London (old standard) 1724. Maker's mark: N. G., obliquely across a square stamp. The foot has been added, and the upper part has been

formerly a domestic salver. It bears the crest: a griffin's head erased, with collar of vair. It is probable that this vessel was bought at the same time as the chalice, as the price paid for the latter is excessive, and in that case the crest may be that of "the Revd Lemesures."

- 3. Paten.—Pewter. H. \(\frac{3}{4}\) in., diam. $9\frac{1}{4}$ in. Counterfeit hallmarks: (1) E. B., (2) lion rampant to r., (3) griffin's head erased, to r., (4) crescent—all in rounded rectangles. Maker's marks: (5) crowned X, rampant horse on escutcheon below, (6) half obliterated, Bett erm | in | [L] ondo[n]; on labels. In the centre of the underside are the letters $^{\text{T}}_{R}$ H. Thomas Curle was churchwarden 1765–6, and Robert Higgs parish clerk at the same time.
- 4. Flagon.—Silver plated copper. H. $11\frac{1}{2}$ in., diam. top $4\frac{1}{2}$ in., base $6\frac{3}{16}$ in. No marks. It is of the usual cylindrical type, with spout; the cover is unusually plain, and the foot very little wider than the body.

The following entry occurs in the parish accounts:-

- 1827, August 25. Paid for a flagon for the Communion as per bill, of Mr. Field £3 13 6
- Almsdish.—Brass. H. 1¹/₄ in., diam. 13 in. Foliated cross embossed in the centre; modern. Presented in 1880 by Hon. Emily and Louisa Fremantle.
- 6. Almsbox of Wood.—The type is the same as that at Whaddon (q.v.), but the body is deeper and octagonal; and the cover is returned into the box, so as to conceal the contents, leaving only a narrow slit. The handle is of turned walnut. This box seems to be of amateur workmanship, but perhaps replaces an older one. On the bottom is the inscription: "1842, K. M. P." Rev. Kenneth Mackenzie Pughe was Curate of Swanbourne during the incumbency of Rev. Charles Lucas Reay, 1838 to 1844.

3. Flagon.—Plated. H. 9 in., diam. top 4 in., base $5\frac{1}{2}$ in. Of the usual cylindrical form, and quite plain.

4. Almsdish.—Plated. Diam. 8 in. 'A flat salver with scalloped edge.

1. CUP WITH COVER.—Silver gilt. H. 10 in., diam. 5 in., bowl 3½ in., depth 3 in., [w.] 18 oz. 5 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1734. Maker's mark: I.S., within an oval of dots (Joseph Smith, entered 1728). Cripps O. E. P.4, p. 377, (1731). Bought 1734 (vide under No. 2).

The bowl is cylindrical, with hemispherical bottom, defined by a strong moulding. The stem is slender, with a pear-shaped swelling. Both cup and cover have the Sacred Monogram, with cross fitchée and nails, within rays. (Pl. i.)

This cup has still its original case of wood covered with stamped leather, and lined with green baize. The case has a cylindrical base 4 in. in diam. by 1½ in. high, body 4½ in. high, with narrower cylinder 2 in. by 2 in. for the stem; and ends above in a hemispherical cover; the total height is 9 in., but it does not now quite contain the knob of the chalice cover; it opens on vertical hinges into two equal halves.

- 2. Cup.—Silver (sold). The following entry in Whaddon Church Register has been brought to my notice by Mr. A. Clear, of Winslow:—
 - "In 1734 was bought a new Chalice w'ch cost £9. 8s. 0d.; the old one sold for £2. 15s. 0d., on w'ch was the date 1570, and no other graving."

This must have been the Elizabethan Cup.

- 3. Paten.—Silver. H. 1½ in., diam. 8½ in., foot 3 in., [w.] 14 ozs. 12 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1683. Maker's mark: N W in plain shield. Inscription in script underneath: "The Gift of Wm. Emmerton of ye Middle Temple, London, Esquire." This is a domestic salver, and bears on the upper service the arms [] a chief [] dancetty: over all, on a bar, [] three lions passant [] (Emmerton): the tinctures are not indicated. Above, an esquire's helmet, with the crest, a demilion rampant, holding a halbert, all surrounded by foliage scrolls.
 - 4. Flagon.—Plated. H. 12 in., diam. top 3½ in., base 7 in. This is of the usual cylindrical form, without a spout. It bears the counterfeit hallmarks;—(1) and (3) lion rampant.
 (2)//(1) partly obliterated. Engraved in front is the inscription: whaddon; and the sacred monogram exactly as on the cup. The Flagon may very well be of about the same date as the Cup.
 - 5. Almsbox of Wood.—The box is shovel-shaped, $6\frac{1}{4}$ in. long, $5\frac{3}{4}$ in. broad, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. deep; the upper side of it is partly covered in, leaving an opening next the handle 3 in. long, and the whole width of the box. The handle is straight, rising from the box by curved shoulders, and ends in a knob perforated from front to back for suspension. The total length is $14\frac{3}{4}$ in. At the base of the handle is carved the inscription: R P, 1643. The front and part of one side have been restored, and a duplicate of the whole box is in use together with it.




- Cup with Cover.—Silver. H. 65 in., with cover 75 in., diam. base 33 in., bowl 31 in., depth 35 in., [w.] 10 oz. 19 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1569. Maker's mark: H S linked, in plain shield (cf. Cripps O. E. P4, p. 346 (1570), "probably Henry Sutton:" where the shield is shaped). On the handle of the cover "1570." This cup is of the usual pattern, with a rather elaborately interlaced band of ornament about one-third down the side. (Plate i. and ii. 2.)
 - This cup is mentioned in the Parish Register under date 1682, as follows:—


There is a silver chalice for the Comunion which is with silver cover, given to the Church in 1570, but by whom is unwritten.

- 2-3. PAIR OF CUPS WITH COVER-PATENS.—Silver. H. 8\frac{1}{8} in., diam. base 5 in., bowl 5\frac{1}{8} in., depth 5\frac{3}{8} in., [w.] 29 oz. 1 dwt. each. Hallmarks: London, 1669. Maker's mark: W M, one pellet (? mullet) below; crown of three roses above; in shaped shield. (cf. Cripps O. E. P.4, p. 362, (1668); 393 (1690). Sacred Monogram and cross engraved on the side.
 - These cups are of the quite plain heavy workmanship of the period, and are of unusual size. Their history is given in the Parish Register, under date 1682, as follows:—
 - Sir Edward Smyth, Kt., formertime Lord Chief Justice of Common Pleas in Ireland and Lord of this Manner gave to the parish church of Whitchurch Two large Chalices of perfect silver for the communion each of them weighing one pound (allowing sixteen ounces to the pound) and fifteen ounces, and containing a quart and half a pint.
 - The date of the gift is not quite certain. The cups were made in 1669, but the entry in the Register indicates that the flagon (No. 8), which was made in 1681, was given at the same time. If so, the entry must have been made immediately after their presentation.

- Sir Edward Smyth (or Smith) was buried at Whitchurch, 26 Feb., 168½, and was succeeded by a son of the same name.
- 4-5. COVER-PATENS OF THE CUPS 2-3.—Silver. H. 1\frac{3}{8} in., diam. 6\frac{3}{8} in., foot 3 in., [w.] 9 oz. 2 dwts. Quite plain, with feet; same marks as the cups; Sacred Monogram on the foot-handle.
- 6-7. Almsdishes or Patens. Silver. H. \(\frac{3}{4}\) in., diam. 10 in., [w.] 15 oz. 19 dwts. each. Hallmarks: London, 1668. Maker's mark: W M, as on the cups. Sacred Monogram in the centre. These are plain flat salvers, and were presented together with the cups; in the Register of 1682, already quoted, they are described as "Plates."
- 8. Flagon.—Silver. H. 11\(\frac{3}{8}\) in., diam. top 4\(\frac{1}{2}\) in., base 6\(\frac{3}{8}\) in., [w.] 54 oz. 14 dwts. Hallmarks: London, 1681 (the stamp is peculiar, for the shield has its five angles produced into long points). Maker's mark: I M, with three pellets above and three below; within a ring of dots in a round stamp (cf. Cripps O. E. P.\(\frac{4}{7}\), p. 393). In front, the Sacred Monogram engraved within rays, with cross above, and a heart pierced by three nails below. The Flagon is of the usual nearly cylindrical form.
- N.B.—There exists, also in the Parish Register, another inventory of these vessels under date 7th May, 1822, made and signed by Rev. Thos. Archer (Vicar).
- 9-10.—Modern Brass Cross and Candlesticks.
